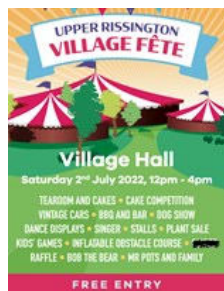

This time, the title should really say, "Desperately Seeking (*More*) Susans, Spencers and Jonathans" as we have, since last writing, gained not one, not two but three new councillors, so I offer a very warm welcome to Cllrs Susan Bates, Spencer Edgar and Jonathan Truslow who have joined our number in the last few months. They are already representing residents' views eloquently and together with the rest of the existing councillors working in the best interests of the village.

We do still have 3 vacancies however, and therefore the origin of the title of this article – in particular it would great to see some representation from Sandy Lane/Southgate Courts and the Victory Fields houses to give an even broader view of residents across the village. If you are not sure, then please do get in touch or come and see us at one of the monthly council meetings (usually 2nd Monday of the month) in the Village Hall to see what we get up to. Speaking to one of the new councillors is also a great way of understanding what is expected, and hopefully they can ease any worries if anyone is considering it. It's a worthwhile volunteer role that, whilst busy at times, is always very interesting and incredibly important for our village. Please do give it some consideration, and help make a difference for our lovely village.

Earlier in the summer we were proud to have been able to support the village Jubilee celebrations with a financial grant to the organising committee, which was a resounding success and very enjoyable event for us all. We are able to support events and community-focussed organisations in the village so if something springs to mind then please do get in touch. We're also looking for feedback from the regular users of the Village Hall – is there something we can do to make it an even better facility for us? If you have an idea how we might make improvements, then please do get in touch and we can consider suggestions through our council process to hopefully bring them to fruition – just let us know.



We are still maintaining the pressure on the developers to make some progress around the village – I'm afraid it's not an easy task and they cannot actually be *forced* to do anything, so please do bear with us. We have a monthly meeting with them to keep our views and wishes for the village on the table which is very useful. They are still responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of a significant proportion of the village so if there is something you see that needs attention then please do pass



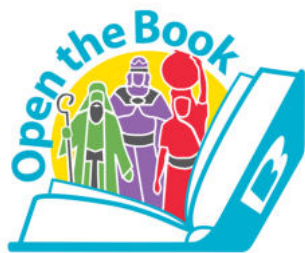
the details on to Vanessa, the Parish Clerk, and we will try to get it sorted as soon as possible. Many of you will have seen some progress on the playing field with one of the last pieces of the Public Open Space jigsaw, the long awaiting Bowling Green. This (along with the cricket wicket) is the last of the work that the developers need to do to satisfy the approved planning permission, so once that looks ready, you can expect the handover process to follow shortly after. We have asked the developers to consider a method to get the Tennis Courts and the

Allotments into use ahead of schedule and ahead of the rest of the adoption of the Public Open Space; at time of writing we are currently waiting to hear their views and hopefully I can report more in due course.

One final item from me for this edition - we're hoping to update the URPC website in the not-too-distant future. in The Rissington School

As the priest for the Rissington Communities I am delighted and privileged to lead our fantastic team of Story Tellers – gathered from all the local communities and from across a number of churches – as we go in to lead **Open the Book** Assemblies once a fortnight at both sites of the school.

This is how Open the Book describes itself:

"Open the Book (OtB) offers primary school children an opportunity to hear key Bible stories told by a team of Christians from local churches, who present the stories during assemblies or acts of collective worship. Each presentation takes around 10–15 minutes and can be incorporated into a wider school assembly, or can stand alone. It is a three-year rolling programme with an additional, but optional year of material based on Christian values for schools."

Most of all, Open the Book is great fun and very interactive. The children really enjoy taking part and since last October they have shared with us in telling a number of stories from the Old Testament. We have told the story of creation from Genesis with an amazing number of wriggling, hopping, climbing animals; we have remembered Noah and the flood and been awed at the rainbow at the end; we have learnt about Joseph and his coat of many colours; we have heard about Jonah trying to run away from God and seen him getting swallowed by a whale; and we have read about how the Israelites grumbled and grumbled and grumbled their way through the desert after Moses led them out of Egypt. I wonder if any of the children have shared the stories with you when they got home, because they certainly remember them fortnight by fortnight.

I think I speak for us all when I say we are really looking forward to a new year of sharing Bible stories – stories on which so many of our cultural values are based – with the wonderful children and staff at The Rissington School.

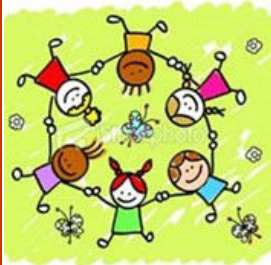

Behind the Road Names in Upper Rissington

– part 17

A P Ellis Road

Group Captain Augustine ap Ellis CBE was Station Commander and Commandant of 6 Flying Training School/Service Flying Training School at RAF Little Rissington from when the airfield opened in August 1938 until sometime in 1940 when command was handed over to Group Captain Charles E. Barraclough.

The Commander was here as the site was being finished, so was able to have a few extras installed; this included an attractive Cotswold wall along the roadway round the edge of the base, and ensuring that the new, exposed RAF Little Rissington was planted with a profusion of traditional British trees. Also, at the Station Commander's house, the garden that was staked out, mysteriously became enlarged one dark night, to just over an acre, the minimum necessary to qualify for a gardener.

Longmore Walk

Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur Murray Longmore, GCB, DSO, DL was born in Manly, New South Wales, Australia on 8 October 1885. He was educated in England before entering Dartmouth Naval College. He was commissioned into the Royal Navy in 1904. Having developed an interest in flying, he volunteered for pilot training when the Navy accepted an offer of training facilities by the Royal Aero Club.

He was the first person (then Lieutenant Longmore) in the UK to take off from land and make a successful water-landing in a modified Short Improved S.27 biplane, on the River Medway off Sheerness.

Longmore joined the Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS) in 1912. Before the outbreak of the First World War, he served as a flight instructor at the newly formed Central Flying School, Upavon. During the war he served as Officer Commanding No. 3 Squadron RNAS and then as Officer Commanding No. 1 Squadron RNAS before being transferred back to sea duties as an officer on the battlecruiser HMS Tiger in 1916.

He obtained a permanent commission in the Royal Air Force in 1920 and was appointed Air Officer Commanding No. 3 Group later that year. He rose through the ranks and the outbreak of the Second World War found Longmore as Air Chief Marshal and in charge of RAF Training Command. On 2 April 1940, he was appointed Air Officer Commanding in the Middle East. He did not for long enjoy the full confidence of Winston Churchill in that position and was relieved of his command in May 1941. His last role before his formal retirement in 1942 was as Inspector-General of the RAF.

Longmore entered a by-election in Grantham as a Conservative candidate in 1942 but was narrowly beaten, in what was a 'two-horse' race. He wrote an autobiography "From Sea to Sky: Memoirs 1910–1945", published 1946. Longmore died on 10 December 1970.

Hurricane Close

The Hawker Hurricane is a British single-seat fighter aircraft of the 1930s–40s which was designed and predominantly built by Hawker Aircraft Ltd for service with the Royal Air Force. It was overshadowed in the public consciousness by the Supermarine Spitfire during the Battle of Britain in 1940 but the Hurricane inflicted 60 percent of the losses sustained by the Luftwaffe in the engagement.

The Hurricane originated from discussions between RAF officials and aircraft designer Sir Sydney Camm about a proposed monoplane derivative of the Hawker Fury biplane in the early 1930s. Hawker refined their monoplane proposal, despite the preference for biplanes by the Air Ministry, incorporating several innovations which became critical to wartime fighter aircraft, including retractable landing gear and the more powerful Rolls-Royce Merlin engine. The Air Ministry ordered the Hurricane in late 1934; the prototype Hurricane K5083 performed its maiden flight on 6 November 1935.

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The Hurricane went into production in June 1936 and entered squadron service in December 1937. Its manufacture and maintenance were eased by using conventional construction methods so that squadrons could perform many major repairs without external support. The Hurricane was rapidly procured prior to the outbreak of the Second World War in September 1939, when the RAF had 18 Hurricane-equipped squadrons in service.

The Hurricane fought in all the major theatres of the Second World War: Battle for France; Operation Dynamo (the evacuation from Dunkirk); Battle of Britain; night fighter and night intruder over occupied Europe; North Africa; Defence of Malta; Air defence in the Soviet Union; Far East; and Aircraft carrier operations.

The Hawker Hurricane was the first Allied Lend-Lease aircraft to be delivered to the Soviet Union with a total of 2,952 Hurricanes eventually delivered, becoming the most numerous British aircraft in Soviet service. Many Soviet pilots were disappointed by the Hawker fighter, regarding it as inferior to both German and Soviet aircraft, but some Soviet pilots "loved the Hurricane" and the RAF Hurricane Mk IIB fighters operating from Soviet soil in defence of Murmansk, destroyed 15 Luftwaffe aircraft for only one loss in combat. By the end of 1941, the RAF pilots having trained their Soviet counterparts to operate the Hurricanes themselves, the RAF's direct role in the region had ended, leaving the Hurricanes behind.

The Hurricane was developed through several versions: bomber-interceptors, fighter-bombers and ground support aircraft as well as fighters. Versions designed for the Royal Navy known as the Sea Hurricane had modifications enabling operation from ships. By the end of production in July 1944, 14,487 Hurricanes had been completed in Britain and Canada, with others built in Belgium and Yugoslavia. A Hurricane was significantly cheaper to build than the Supermarine Spitfire and took 10,300-man hours to produce, compared to 15,200 for a Spitfire.

Out of all the thousands of Hurricanes that were built, approximately sixteen (including three Sea Hurricanes) are in airworthy condition worldwide, although many other non-flying examples survive in various air museums.

Recipe Breeze

Apple Cakes

Ingredients:

- 1lb cooking apples
(stewed with brown sugar)
- 8oz plain flour
- 2 level tsp cream of tartar
- 1 level tsp bicarbonate of soda
- Pinch of salt
- 4oz margarine
- 4oz caster sugar
- 1 egg



Method

Grease 16 patty tins. Mix cream of tartar, bicarbonate of soda and salt with flour and rub in margarine. Stir in caster sugar and mix with beaten egg to form soft, manageable dough. Roll out 0.5 inches thick between baking parchment. Cut out 16 bases and 16 lids with a 2.5 inch pastry cutter. Lift the cake bases into the tins using a palette knife. Cover each with a tsp of apple puree and top with lid (this seals itself during cooking). Sprinkle top with caster sugar. Bake at 200°C for about 15 minutes. Leave to cool slightly in tins then lift out with palette knife and cool on a wire rack.

They don't keep very well but they don't last very long!
